How We Can Support You

An ISVA can help with the options that are available to you:

- **Reporting the crime to the police** so a criminal investigation can be made and taken to court, where possible.
- Contacting SARC (Sexual Assault **Referral Centre).** If you're not ready to report to the police you can still call the SARC for support or medical attention, or for them to gather evidence. You may choose to give your name but you don't have to. SARCs can store the evidence, giving you time to decide if you wish to report or not.
- **Reporting anonymously.** You can still pass on information to the police anonymously via our ISVAs without officially reporting.
- Criminal Injuries Compensation **(CICA).** If you've reported to the police there's a Government compensation scheme for any physical or emotional injuries, or financial losses you've suffered.
- **Civil action.** In certain situations you may be able to claim compensation against the offender, their employer, or an organisation.

You may decide you don't want to do any of the above. That's ok, you must do what's right for you; we will respect your decision. Your ISVA will support you at every stage, whatever vou choose to do.

WHAT WE DO

What is an ISVA?

An ISVA is an Independent Sexual Violence Advocate who provides practical and emotional support if you've been subjected to sexual abuse at any time in your life. Independent from other agencies e.g. the police and social services, they can advocate on your behalf by making sure your voice and needs are heard by other services that support you.

Does an ISVA give counselling?

No, an ISVA provides information and practical, emotional, and advocacy support. This is different to counselling; should you need this kind of support an ISVA can refer you.

I was abused years ago, can I still report?

Yes, you can speak to the police regardless of when you were sexually abused; however, not everything reported ends in a court case. An ISVA can help you to decide if you want to report, and support you at each stage of the process.

If I speak to an ISVA is it confidential?

We'll work with you in a confidential way. This means we will not share any information with your family, the police, or anyone else without your permission. The only time we'll share any information without your permission is if we're

worried about a child or vulnerable person's safety.

I don't want to report to the police, will an ISVA still help me?

Yes, an ISVA can support you whether you report or not. They can arrange appointments for other kinds of support e.g. sexual health, domestic abuse, counselling, drug and alcohol use, health, dental, and optical care. ISVAs may be able to attend with you if you find it distressing to attend alone.

I don't want to report to the police myself, can you do that for me?

An ISVA can't report on your behalf. However, if you want them to pass on information to the police they can do so anonymously. This could be about the offender and what they've done.

Can an ISVA give me information and support on sexually transmitted infections (STI)?

Yes, ISVAs can make and attend an appointment with you to a doctor or sexual health clinic for testing and treatment. They can also help you access STI self-testing kits and provide information on emergency contraception and support if you believe you've recently been subjected to HIV.
